Greetings from Delhi Traffic Police!

As temperatures soar and humidity rises, air-conditioners and fans have become essential comforts. Many of us avoid venturing out in the scorching afternoons, choosing instead to schedule our errands during the cooler hours.

In this extreme weather, please spare a thought for our traffic personnel who continue to perform their duties tirelessly under the sun. Without the comfort of ACs or even proper shade, they manage traffic and ensure safety, often facing increased road rage and rule violations triggered by the heat.

While we can't change the weather, we can change our attitude. Let's treat our traffic personnel with empathy. Follow traffic rules, remain patient on the roads, and if possible, offer a kind word of appreciation—it makes a difference.

The continuous addition of new vehicles is putting increasing pressure on both our roads and our traffic personnel, whose workload continues to rise. In 2024 alone, over 7 lakh vehicles were registered in Delhi. Recent data shows, that the number of registered Light Motor Vehicles rose from 15,258 in March 2025 to 15,777 in April 2025. This growing volume directly impacts our traffic personnel. With more vehicles on the road, each officer is forced to shoulder an even greater burden.

We are grateful for the support of companies like Amul, which has provided probiotic Chhachh to our staff, and Honda and Hero Motocorp, who are helping us with road safety training and awareness about proper helmet use. A quality helmet can be the difference between life and death in an accident. Please avoid cheap, substandard ones—they often fail when it matters most.

As we endure the summer, the upcoming monsoon season will bring its own challenges.

Low-lying areas are prone to waterlogging, but we, along with PWD, NHAI, and the Jal

Board, are working hard to identify and fix vulnerable spots before the rains arrive.

Your cooperation is vital. Please stay updated with our traffic advisories, avoid waterlogged or jammed routes, and help us ensure smooth, safe travel for all.

Let's continue to be partners in making Delhi's roads safer and more efficient.



NEWS IN BRIEF

Overspeeding & Improper Parking Lead Traffic Violations in May'25



- ▶1. Overspeeding, with a whopping 2,65,746 challans, between 1st 31st May '25, tops the long list of 27 heads of traffic violations committed by the perpetually hurrying Delhites.
- ▶ 2. The second dubious position for highest challans went to Improper or Obstructive Parking with 1,92,292 challans in May'25.
- ➤ 3. The third highest number of challans, (1,05,007 challans) was issued for the offense of driving without a helmet.
- ▶ 4. In May 2025, 78,302 challans for no PUCC, 52,055 for helmetless riding, and 46,362 for red light jumping followed the top three fine-generating offences.



NEWS IN BRIEF

- ▶GOOD NEWS: Statistics available with Delhi Traffic Police show that there have been fewer accidents from January 1 to May 31, 2025, compared to the same period in 2024.
- NON INJURY CRASHES: Have reduced from 45 in 2024 to 25 in 2025.
- ► FATAL CRASHES: Have reduced from 643 in 2024 to 556 in 2025.
- ► PERSONS KILLED: Have reduced from 652 in 2024 to 577 in 2025.
 - "Our mission is 'Zero Deaths on Delhi Roads', and so the downward trend in accidents compared to last year is nothing to gloat about, but still any reduction in accidents is good. Delhi Traffic Police is striving hard round the clock to spread awareness about Road Safety, Traffic Rules, safe driving habits. If people follow these rules strictly we will have minimal accidents and precious lives would be saved", said Addl CP- T/ Zone II, Sh Dinesh Kumar Gupta, IPS.

DOWNWARD TREND IN ACCIDENTS FROM JAN TO MAY 2025






DELHI TRAFFIC POLICE STEPS UP E-RICKSHAW IMPOUNDMENTS



- Delhi Traffic Police has issued 2,30,617 challans to E- Rickshaw drivers from 1st January 15th June 2025
- Of these, 2,12,470 are 'On The Spot' challans and 18,137 were sent based on camera surveillance.
- These apart, 1159 E-Rickshaws were impounded between 1st January to 31st May'25 due to various violations like Drunken driving and non production of vehicle documents etc.

- ▶ 445 waterlogging hotspots identified in Delhi.
- Of these, 57 spots have been marked as those with recurrent waterlogging problem, which get waterlogged with slightest rain.
- Among these 57 waterlogging prone zones, 18 lie in Traffic Zone I and 39 in Traffic Zone II.
- Some of these spots lie in GTK Road, IP Marg,
 Pusa Road, Press Enclave Road and several
 spots along Ring Road, Minto Bridge etc.

Delhi Identifies 445 Waterlogging Hotspots; Traffic Police Collaborates with Civic Bodies to Tackle Crisis



- ► Hon'ble CM Delhi, Smt Rekha Gupta, has held several meetings with Delhi Traffic Police and civic agencies to find ways to mitigate the waterlogging problem expeditiously before the monsoons.
- ► A sub-committee has also been formed under the chairmanship of Delhi Traffic Police Jt Commissioner, Sh Kime Kaming, IPS, with members drawn from Delhi Traffic Police, PWD, MCD, NHAI, Jal Board etc to work out solutions on priority basis.
- Desilting of drains and repair works are on in full swing.
- ▶ Jt CP Kime Kaming, IPS, informed that apart from desilting, the committee has recommended "exploring possibilities of inserting underground cameras to check which drains are blocked."
- Another recommendation which has been accepted is to "use portable pumps equipped with special sensors instead of standard static pumps, which often become submerged and stop working. Unlike static pumps that activate only after water levels have already risen, sensor-fitted pumps will start operating as soon as water levels begin to rise, helping to prevent waterlogging", Jt CP Kaming said.
- The committee has initiated study of each waterlogging prone area to determine the most suitable pump for each location.
- The committee's suggestion to carefully determine the hosepipe length and water discharge location to prevent backflow, has been accepted.






INTERNATIONAL YOGA DAY OBSERVATION BY DELHI TRAFFIC POLICE



- The drives were welcomed by the public and commuters who were facing huge difficulties due to narrowing of the roads. People hoped that these illegal squatters would not return again soon.



TRIBUTE TO A REMARKABLE JOURNEY



SI CHANDRAN P.T.:

With almost 39 years dedicated to Delhi Police, SI Chandran P.T. hailing from Kerala, a 1986 Delhi Police recruit, has invaluable experience of 24 glorious years with the Road Crash Cell of Delhi Traffic Police.


As such, he is a man with deep understanding about road accidents. A silent, calm, affable, soft spoken workaholic, SI Chandran fondly recollects how he and

and team had to manually feed in accident data in registers before the Cell got computerized in 1999. "I and my team computerized the Cell. The Road Crash Cell was called Accident Research Cell before. The name was changed in 2022", he nostalgically informs.

SI Chandran's contributions to the Road Crash Cell include painstakingly digitalizing the accident data and preparing analysis report every 15 days. These are then passed to concerned Traffic officials and private agencies to research how the accidents could be stopped and what interventions are needed.




Other responsibilities included marking of accident prone zones, black spots, and pointing at required interventions, providing inputs for preparation of Delhi Road Crash report.



SI Chandran talks about how accidents could be drastically reduced at ISBT Kashmere Gate due to analysis and suggestions by the Road Crash Cell. "ISBT Bus Adda had been an accident black spot for over 10 years. Villagers and pedestrians often used to be hit by vehicles as they used to run across roads in their urgency to catch buses and jump over dividers. On our suggestion, the height of the divider was raised from the earlier low 2-3 ft to 9 ft. Also a cement divider was built replacing the iron dividers which often used to be broken by thieves and drug addicts to sell the iron. Now a subway has also come up and the spot is no longer an accident black spot", Chandran informs about one of the many positive interventions.

Through Their Eyes: A Journey of Duty, Honor, and Reflection









SI (Exe) CHAUHAN MAFABHAI JAVANBHAI:

A Delhi Police recruit of 1985, SI Chauhan retired after a 7 year "extremely satisfying" stint with the Traffic Division. Posted in busy, congested areas like Sadar Bazar, Tilak Nagar, Janak Puri as well as the tony Chanakya Puri, SI Chauhan feels that the sustained campaign of Road Safety added with the hiked fines for violations have helped to make people more careful about following traffic rules.

SI (Exe) SURENDER SINGH:

A 1986 recruit in Delhi Police, SI Surender Singh hailing from Sonepat, Haryana retired after a 3 years stint with the Traffic division. He feels that the Traffic Division is hugely short staffed taking into consideration the rapidly increasing vehicles on Delhi roads. Road rage, drivers not following traffic rules, unregistered E-Rickshaws, are some problems that need strict controlling, he said.

ASI (Exe) ABDUL KHALID:

A private security guard turned Delhi Police personnel, ASI Abdul Khalid is a 1993 recruit who says that his joining Delhi Police "brought immense pride" to him and his family. Hailing from Meerut, UP, ASI Abdul has had a 7 year stint with the Traffic Division. He shares countless interesting memories including an incident when he and team nabbed a murderer, who had jumped into a pond to escape arrest!

ASI (Driver) Karam Vir Singh:

A 1988 recruit with Delhi Police, ASI Driver Karam Vir Singh joined the Traffic Division 12 years ago, and since then he has had a "fruitful time." Ferrying accident victims to hospitals, rescuing victims of domestic violence, taking police personnel to the desired places were parts of his duties. He proudly salutes Delhi Police as " the best force" and says working here earned him respect from all.

ASI (Exe) LALACHAN G:

A 1986 recruit with Delhi Police, ASI Lalachan G. joined the Traffic Division 8 years ago. He says he has had a "wonderful" stint with Delhi Police and recounts occasions from his posting at Tihar jail where his duties included taking undertrials and dangerous criminals to hospitals, court etc.



Dear Delhites,

Flouting of traffic rules continues to be a serious challenge for the Delhi Traffic Police. In response, we have launched a series of proactive and sustained efforts to spread awareness and instill a culture of road safety across the city. One of our key initiatives includes conducting road safety workshops on a war footing, with a special focus on the younger generation.

Summer camps are currently being held across Delhi to educate children on safe walking, cycling, and driving practices. We believe that informed children will, in turn, help educate their parents and communities. The response to these camps has been stupendous and encouraging.

In addition to children, we are targeting various commuter segments including DTC bus drivers, auto-rickshaw drivers, and general road users. Our teams are actively visiting schools, colleges, DTC depots, TSR stands, malls, historical sites, and traffic training parks to spread the message of safe commuting.

Innovative methods like music and quiz programs, painting competitions, and interactive games are being used to engage the public. We are also affixing free red reflective tapes on bicycles to enhance their visibility at night, and we continue to appeal to citizens to avoid unnecessary honking, especially around hospitals, which we are declaring as 'No Honking Zones.'

Further, we are offering free scooter training for women and bicycle lessons for children, along with specialized training for corporate drivers and other professional segments.

Our commitment to road safety is unwavering, and we urge all Delhiites to cooperate with traffic regulations for the well-being of all. Together, let us build a safer and more responsible traffic environment in the capital.

- Children are very good observers and therefore, parents must set an example by meticulously observing even small traffic rules.
