Dear Delhites,

Greetings to all! As we step into a warmer month, I would like to take a moment to express gratitude to each law abiding responsible driver, and to our traffic police personnel who sacrifice celebrating festivals for duty.

Due to elaborate arrangements to curb traffic rule violations, drunken driving, and accidents during Holi, coupled with the unwavering commitment of our traffic police personnel, we could achieve a significant reduction in fatal accidents which dropped from 14 in 2024 to 4 this year—a remarkable 28.57% decrease.

However, no loss of life is acceptable. Our mission, Zero Death On Roads, continues to be our guiding principle.

Another positive development was the successful National Lok Adalat held on March 8th. Over 1.22 lakh traffic challans were settled. We understand that many people wait for Lok Adalats to reduce their challan amounts, which is detriment to quick clearing of the staggering backlog. To address this, evening courts are now functioning at all 7 court complexes on working days between 5-7 pm. We are also exploring the possibility of increasing Lok Adalat frequency or establishing a dedicated traffic court to expedite challan settlements.

Furthermore, we are exploring possibilities of incorporating traffic rules into school curriculums to enhance awareness and compliance from an early age, reducing future violations.

As part of Delhi Police Week in February, we organized various awareness initiatives including walkathons, bike rallies, talks in schools, colleges, and roads, along with free helmet distribution and rule adherence pledges. Traffic experts provided insights, and medical camps were conducted to promote well-being. During the symposium held on this occasion, our respected Commissioner, Sh. Sanjay Arora, IPS, rightly reminded our personnel to act responsibly and courteously as the most visible face of Delhi Police.

I also appeal to you, our esteemed citizens, to uphold the spirit of responsibility and patience as the visible face of India. While we understand the inconvenience caused by VIP movements and resulting route disturbances, let us embrace our pride in being residents of the National Capital. As hosts to important guests, let us embody the spirit of "Atithi Devo Bhava."



The importance of Road Safety Awareness programmes was stressed upon.





OVER 1.22 LAKH TRAFFIC CHALLANS SETTLED DURING NATIONAL LOK ADALAT





A total cumulative fine of Rs. 1.07 crore were collected against the traffic challans.

Delhi Traffic Police actively coordinated with Delhi State Legal Services Authority for successfully conducting the Lok Adalat.

Pending compoundable traffic challans and notices

including pollution fines under Graded Response Action plan (GRAP) were taken up.

"I had fines totalling to 22 K for speeding and improper parking. At the Lok Adalat I could get the fines slashed to 4k", said happy taxi driver Mani Sah, wishing for more frequent Lok Adalats.



- Responding to the public demand, Sh Ajay Chaudhary, IPS, Special Commissioner of Delhi Police, Traffic (Zone II) said, "We are working towards increasing frequency of Lok Adalats or if possible have separate traffic court in each court complex. The backlog is huge. People keep waiting for Lok Adalats for reduction of fines. In my opinion repeated commercial vehicle offenders should not be treated with leniency, as it is sometimes misused and fails to deter future violations."
- Evening Courts are also functioning on all working days between 5pm-7pm at all 7 court complexes of Delhi to clear the backlog from before 2021.

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY CELEBRATIONS



Delhi Traffic Police paid respect to women, in collaboration with Hero MotoCorp by organising a widely participated special event on 8th March, International Women's Day.

Sh Satya Vir Katara, IPS, Addl CP T/HQ presided over the event.

Over 125 women including

college students and women officers attended the function.

Sh Satya Vir Katara asserted that Delhi Traffic Police has always upheld Indian ethos in respecting women, championing empowerment, self reliance and security.





The event featured sessions on road safety, legal rights, self defence, mental health, yoga, physical fitness etc. Entertainment was also included.




YIELDS DRASTIC REDUCTION IN ACCIDENTS

 Delhi Traffic Police made elaborate arrangements on Holi (Dhulendi) on March 14, to curb dangerous driving.


PROSECUTIONS ON HOLI (14.03.25)



Enforcement of strict traffic measures on Holi, 14th March, led to drastic reduction in number of accidents (including Simple Accidents, Fatal Accidents and Total Accidents) compared to the past two years.

ROAD ACCIDENTS IN DELHI ON HOLI (2023-2025)

STRICT TRAFFIC MEASURES ON HOLI



- 84 special teams with alcometers to check drunken driving were deployed across key roads, intersections and high traffic areas throughout Delhi.
- 40 joint checking teams of Traffic Police and Local Police were also deployed to detect and prosecute traffic violators.
- A total of 7230 violators were challaned from 8 am to 12 midnight on 14 March.
- In terms of numbers and percentage breakdown:

A total number of 1213 people (16.8% of the total prosecuted) were challaned for drunk driving.

573 or 7.92 % were prosecuted for Triple Riding

2376 people or 32.9 % were challaned for riding without helmets.

97 vehicles or 1.34 % were challaned for having Tinted glasses.

2971 vehicles or 41.09 % were challaned for other offences.



- Sh Ajay Chaudhary, IPS, Special Commissioner, Traffic (Zone II) commended his team, "We are pleased that the dedicated efforts of our traffic personnel, who sacrificed celebrating Holi with their families and friends to enforce traffic laws rigorously, have yielded positive results. Thanks to their commitment, we successfully reduced fatal accidents from 10 on Holi of 2023, 14 on day of Holi 2024 to 4 this year on Holi, 14th March 2025."
- Simple Accidents reduced from 14 on Holi of 2023, 13 in 2024 to 8 this year. Thus there was a total reduction of accidents on Holi day from 24 in 2023, 27 in 2024 to 12 in 2025.

DELHI TRAFFIC POLICE DISTRIBUTES FREE HELMETS TO PROMOTE SAFETY OF

TWO-WHEELERS: On 22nd February Ashok Vihar Traffic Circle in collaboration with national road safety NGO, TRAX, distributed 225 certified free helmets to 2-wheelers to spread the message that wearing helmets mitigates risk of severe head injuries and fatalities.

The helmets were distributed on first come-first serve basis at Dilli Haat, NSP foot over bridge, Safeda Picket & Netaji Subhash Place.

SURAKSHA KA VADA: Further, at Seelampur T- Point, Delhi Traffic Police personnel in collaboration with Sewa NGO, ONGC and RWA New Seelampur, gave two - wheeler riders free helmets and roses with the condition that they pledge to wear the helmets while riding and adhere to traffic rules.

Sh K Jegadeshan, IPS, Spl CP Traffic (Zone 1) and Sh Shashank Jaiswal, IPS, DCP T/ HQ commended the beneficial programme.

► FREE EYES & EARS CHECK - UP: Delhi Traffic Police, Northern Range, organised a Free Eyes & Ears Check Up camp in association with Pehla kadam-Ek Ummeed NGO & Dr Shroff Eye Hospital at Sanjay Gandhi Transport Nagar, SP Badli.

More than 200 truck drivers and others undertook the free check-ups

Following the check-ups, more than 150 drivers who were found to be needing spectacles (chashma) were given the same free of cost.

Ms Sandhya Swamy, DCP T/ Northern Range and Sh Dheeraj Narrang, ACP T/ Outer North interacted with the truck drivers, transporters and general public, heard their grievances and motivated them to follow traffic rules, help accident victims without fear of prosecution etc.

- ► PAINTING & QUIZ COMPETITIONS: Quiz and painting competitions with road safety as theme were organised at various schools and prizes were given.
- Nataks or street plays with Rahul Khanna Theatre group and others were organised to spread road safety messages. Value Life Foundation taught CPR training and other life saving skills to attendees

FEW MORE ACTIVITIES OF DELHI TRAFFIC POLICE DURING DELHI POLICE WEEK



















Delhi Traffic Police organized a variety of programmes during Delhi Police Week to showcase its regular activities.

All of them were widely attended.

Road safety Awareness lectures, Symposium, Walkathons, Motorcylce rallies, quiz and painting contests focusing on traffic rules, banner and poster displays, on road interactions were some of the programmes undertaken.

Activities included affixing reflective tapes on cycles, conducting workshops among DTC, TSR and other drivers; workshops in schools, colleges, reputed private companies & general public etc.

MAPPING SECTION

- The Mapping Section plays a crucial role in ensuring efficient traffic management by identifying congestion points, optimizing traffic movement, assisting in planning detours and laying out alternate routes.
- Thus be it marking out routes for VIPs to take, closing down of certain routes during VIP movement or road maintenance and charting out alternate routes for the public to save them from delays, laying out routes for rallies or processions, alighting or parking route plans for crowds at cricket matches or festival venues, the Mapping Section is always called upon to chart the path.



- - "Mapping out a city helps in ensuring smooth traffic flow with minimal inconvenience to the public always on the move. Every diversion, barricade, route change is planned and mapped before they are implemented on the ground", says Additional Commissioner of Police, Sh. Satya Vir Katara, IPS
- Working on Autocad, the duties of Delhi Police personnel manning the Mapping Section include mapping out traffic black spots or accident prone areas so that focused safety measures can be implemented in those areas.
- Mapping out encroached areas, roads needing removal of poles, waterlogging or other hurdles, aiding in designing of new roads, flyovers, bridges and traffic signals based on traffic density are few other works designated to the Mapping Section.
- ASI Anil Lamba, a 1989 Delhi Police recruit with a diploma in Civil Draftsmanship from ITI, apart from graduation degree from Moti Lal College, DU, a key personnel in the Mapping Section, is proud that he is able, albeit in his low profile quiet way, to help the public navigate busy Delhi roads better. "Be it laying out VIP routes during the recent Delhi CM's swearing-in ceremony, or routes for visitors during Republic Day programme at Kartavya Path, entry of LMVs, or restrictions of HGVs or MGVs etc, we chart it all beforehand", he says.
- Though the maximum work is with the Traffic Division, the Mapping Section of Delhi Police is also tasked to map crime scenes, crime patterns in locations etc.

ROAD SAFETY AWARENESS

Affixing Reflective tapes on cycles

- 1655 numbers of cycles affixed with reflective red tape in February '25.
- 2008 numbers of cycles affixed with reflective red tape in January '25 by Delhi Traffic Police.
- Affixing reflective red tapes increases the cycle's visibility on the roads especially during nights and fog, thereby reducing accident risk.
- Areas in which Delhi Traffic Police personnel affixed reflective tapes in February include Mandoli Fatak, Hanuman Lane, Kali Bari Lane, Inderlok intersection, Telco Gazipur etc.
- "The reflective tapes act like back lights for us. They shine when the lights of the vehicles behind us fall on them, thereby making us visible. It is for our safety. I thank Delhi Traffic Police personnel for caring for us", said a cyclist.

Through the lens of time, every memory is a treasure, every experience is a lesson for the future generations of police.



" I give full credit to my wife for the excellent education and upbringing our three children. As I was fully dedicated to my challenging duty with Delhi Police, I could not spare much time for my family", SI (Exe) Subhash Chander who retired recently on 28 February, recounts the story of our police personnel who work through every festival, rains, winters and summers, day and night. A 1989 recruit, SI Subhash Chander, hailing from Harvana, was posted in the traffic division in 2018. He proudly recollects how he and his team in Mehrauli, cracked the unfortunate murder of a 6 year old boy by his relatives among other memorable experiences.

" I hold discipline as foremost quality to be imbibed. Discipline encompasses reporting to duty on time, wearing one's uniform properly with dignity, performing every given task with seriousness and dedication and also never giving in to temptation or slackness", says SI (Exe) Rana Pratap Singh, proud to have served Delhi Police for 39 years till he retired on 28 February '25. Recepient of around 150 appreciation letters and having participated in Delhi Police's Republic Day and Independence Day parades, Singh recounts a fascinating story of how Delhi Police nabbed a gang of two-wheeler theives who sold guavas during daytime and stole vehicles at night! Singh and team recovered over 40 stolen two -wheelers from the gang.



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" My over 36 year journey with Delhi Police has been happy and mentally rewarding. When I joined in 1989, I had not even sprouted moustache or beard !", laughs retiree Amar Singh who proudly claims to have got promoted to SI rank before retirement. Being posted with the Traffic Division in 2017, Amar Singh says he used to stand near petrol pumps, check PUC certificates of vehicles and make the defaulters go and get their certificates on the spot, threatening to challan them otherwise. "People used to thank me for saving them fines. I advised them to obey laws instead of policemen forcing them to do so."









I request Delhi Traffic Police to ensure that the online site to pay challans works. I wasted many hours a few days back trying to pay my challan online. Even the e-challan website was not working. I just gave up after a while. I'm sure there are many like me. Going to Lok Adalat to pay one small fine is not convenient.

As the National Capital and nerve center of the government, Delhi frequently hosts foreign dignitaries and state heads. Managing VIP movements requires precision and caution, balancing security concerns while minimizing public inconvenience. Our dedicated teams meticulously map daily routes, ensuring that VIP convoys move seamlessly while alternative routes are provided to the public. Large gatherings and events, which increase traffic pressure, are also efficiently managed by our officers.

Beyond managing vehicular movement, our personnel face multiple challenges—pollution, road rage, and traffic violations—all while ensuring road safety. Supporting them is a robust team behind the scenes, including our Public Interface Unit (PIU), which responds to thousands of commuter queries and distress calls daily. The PIU provides real-time updates on traffic congestion, roadblocks, vehicle breakdowns, waterlogging, and other disruptions. Additionally, we swiftly address complaints regarding non-functional signals and road hazards such as fallen trees.

Public awareness and education are integral to our mission. A dedicated division works tirelessly to educate citizens about traffic rules and road safety measures. We also run pre-paid taxi and auto services, offer free scooty and cycle riding training for women, and organize several welfare activities for the public.

We urge all Delhiites to join hands with us in making our roads safer, reducing pollution, and ensuring a more organized traffic system. Together, let's build a cleaner, safer, and more disciplined Delhi.
